

Submission Guidelines for Articles

Publishing an article in eVox

Georgetown students and faculty engaged in sociolinguistic research are invited to submit their work for publication in eVox. Manuscript submissions should present original research while also developing theoretical implications for some area of sociolinguistic inquiry.

eVox accepts submissions that address any intersection of language, discourse, & society from the perspective of any subfield of linguistics, whether sociolinguistics, discourse analysis, variation analysis, applied linguistics, cognitive linguistics, theoretical, or computational and corpus-based linguistics. We hope that eVox will represent the breadth and diversity of current sociolinguistic research at Georgetown, and only your submissions can help us achieve this goal.

eVox is a "working papers" publication and therefore does not constitute "prior publication" (i.e. a paper that appears in eVox is eligible for publication in a professional journal later on). On the other hand, anything published in eVox can still be referenced in a bibliography and enhance your Curriculum Vitae.

Submissions

To submit a manuscript for publication in eVox, you should do two things:

1. Put three hard copies of the manuscript (without identifying information) in the eVox editor's mailbox in the department. Include a separate sheet with the author's name and contact information.
2. Send the manuscript as a Word attachment (without identifying information) to evoxjournal@gmail.com. In the body of the email, please include the title of the manuscript, author's name, and contact information.

The eVox editor will read every manuscript submission and decide if the paper is suitable for review. If so, the manuscript will be sent out for at least 2 anonymous peer-reviews, and the author will be notified of review recommendations as soon as possible.

Format

All article submissions must be formatted according to the eVox Style Sheet.

Length

Articles published in eVox vary in length, but do not normally exceed 8,000 words (excluding examples, transcripts, and bibliography).
